


Vision Statement for the International Nations for First Nations Conference 2025

Dear Friends, Colleagues, and Leaders,

There is an urgent need to enhance the economic and social well-being of Indigenous/First Nations communities, ensuring they have the same opportunities and quality of life as the broader population. Addressing long-standing challenges requires personal communion with the Creator along with a commitment to equitable access to education, economic empowerment, and meaningful engagement with Indigenous perspectives on land ownership, stewardship and restorative justice.

This Vision is in **Commemoration of the 30th Anniversary** of a seed that was planted in Elijah Harper's heart after a time of spiritual renewal in June of 1995 for a Sacred Assembly later that year.



This Vision is in Direct Alignment with Elijah Harper's Vision for Canada

At the Sacred Assembly in Hull (present-day Gatineau, Québec) from December 6 - 9, 1995, Elijah Harper articulated a vision for Canada at a National Gathering attended by some 3,000 delegates, including the Prime Minister of Canada, representatives of all political parties and church leaders from all denominations, particularly those who were involved in the residential schools that has left a legacy of an unholy partnership and alliance between the church and the political authorities in promoting policies of paternalism, colonization and assimilation. In that Gathering the late Elijah Harper stated:

"I have a vision for this country we call Canada. It is not my vision, it is a vision of our people, the First Nations. It is the vision of our forefathers. It is a vision that lies in the hearts and souls of our people. It is inherent in our traditional values. It is inherent in the way that we look at life. Above all, *it is a vision that acknowledges and embraces the supremacy of God our Creator. This is the vision that was inherent in the treaties that were made with the newcomers that came to this land with their governments."*




Elijah Harper, OM (March 3, 1949 – May 17, 2013) was a Canadian Oji-Cree politician who served as a member of the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba (MLA) from 1981 to 1992 and a member of Parliament (MP) from 1993 to 1997.

"This vision embraces unity, caring, loving and sharing, but this vision has been lying dormant. It has not been appreciated and understood by many Canadians. We know that God has established landmarks and boundaries. The Creator so happened to place the Indigenous People in this part of the world that we know as Canada, and when He placed us here, He gave us certain responsibilities to this land."

"We have a responsibility to maintain the unity of this land, and to sustain the environment. Our forefathers had difficulty in understanding the concept of owning land. It is alien, like the concept of owning air."

"But we understand the need to use the land for the benefit of everybody, not for greed, it has become more apparent that these things need to be resolved, and that the *political* process has failed us. I believe that there is something missing, which is the *spiritual* element."



In December 1995, the "Reconciliation Proclamation" emerged from the Sacred Assembly, a gathering where people from various spiritual traditions, aiming to pursue justice and healing between Canada and Indigenous peoples, committing faith communities to walk with Indigenous peoples toward spiritual and political healing.

Statements from the "Reconciliation Proclamation":

- "We share the recognition that reconciliation between Indigenous and Non-Indigenous Canadians must be rooted in a spiritual understanding of land as a gift from the Creator God.
- "We share an understanding that the starting point for healing and reconciliation lies in personal communion with the Creator God."
- "We share an understanding that while change must take place at all levels of society, it must be rooted most firmly in the communities."



"Elijah said it very well from an earlier statement, 'What has been missing from all the hard work that has gone, through the courts and the political process in recent years has been the spiritual perspective that lies behind these demands for justice.'

These values are spiritual, not political. And I think, Mr. Harper, that you have found a new way.

Spirituality is missing a lot in our society, and spirituality is absolutely needed to find the right way."

Challenges Facing Indigenous/First Nations Communities

Indigenous/First Nations people continue to face barriers rooted in historical treaties, government policies, and economic dependency. These barriers have contributed to high poverty rates, limited access to education, unemployment, inadequate housing, and social issues such as crime, substance abuse, and family disruption. The impact extends to mental health challenges, higher incarceration rates, and the ongoing crisis of missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls, men and boys.

It is our collective responsibility to ensure that Indigenous/First Nations communities have access to the resources, opportunities, and policies needed to build a stronger, more sustainable future.

Building a Stronger Future Through Education and Opportunity

- Spirituality which prioritizes the supremacy of the Creator, and personal communion with the Creator as the foundation for change – The unifying and integrating factor of all human beings is that we all come from one Creator who created us in His image and likeness to reflect the dignity and value of all human beings, and to be able to love and to be generous to all people, including those that have lost the Creator's path as are described in the Seven Teachings.
- Education as Essential for Lasting Change Investing in Indigenous/First Nations education is essential to economic growth and long-term sustainability. This includes increasing funding for post-secondary education, expanding literacy programs, and creating pathways into trades, business, and professional careers.

- Preserving Culture While Advancing Economic Growth Education should respect and uphold Indigenous culture, traditions, and land-based knowledge. At the same time, Indigenous students must have equal opportunities to pursue careers in medicine, law, trades, education, and entrepreneurship, fostering self-reliance and reducing dependency on government support.
- Beyond Assimilation and Segregation The challenges Indigenous/First Nations communities face will not be solved through forced assimilation or continued segregation. The legacy of residential schools and exclusionary policies have marginalized Indigenous communities for too long. The path forward is through collaboration, investment, and inclusive policy development that empowers Indigenous/First Nations people as equal contributors to economic and social progress.

NATIONAL CALL FOR PRAYER FOCUS

A National Call for Prayer for the Healing of the Traditional Custodians of Canada and Their Land

The International Nations for First Nations Conference 2025 is focused on three key areas:

- 1. **Clarity** Bringing focus to the pressing challenges Indigenous/First Nations peoples face and providing clear, actionable solutions.
- 2. **Motivation** Inspiring individuals, leaders, and organizations to take responsibility for addressing Indigenous socio-economic challenges through sustainable development, education, and policy change.
- Urgency Recognizing that the time for action is now. We must work together to implement meaningful reforms and address disparities in education, employment, and well-being for Indigenous communities.

The **Nations for First Nations Conference 2025** is a Faith based gathering dedicated to interceding for the healing, restoration, and empowerment of Indigenous/First Nations peoples, the traditional custodians of the land, alongside the healing of the land itself.

Rooted in faith, truth, and reconciliation, this conference is a **spiritual movement** calling for **national and international prayer, repentance, and action** in unity with the Holy Spirit. It is a time to stand in the gap, acknowledging historical injustices, seeking divine healing, and committing to a future of **reconciliation**, **justice**, **and spiritual revival**.

1. CLARITY – Understanding the Root Causes and Seeking Divine Direction

"For lack of vision, the people perish..." (Proverbs 29:18)

A clear understanding of the realities faced by Indigenous/First Nations peoples in Canada is necessary for healing and reconciliation.

Spiritual and Historical Context

- 1. Indigenous/First Nations peoples are the traditional custodians of Canada, holding a deep spiritual relationship with the land, water, and all living beings.
- 2. Colonialism led to **forced displacement**, **cultural destruction**, **intergenerational trauma**, **and systemic discrimination**, resulting in ongoing socio-economic challenges.
- 3. Many Indigenous people today experience **poverty, discrimination, inadequate access to education, healthcare, and housing**, which leads to disparities in life expectancy, high incarceration rates, and mental health struggles.
- 4. According to the **2021 Census**, over **1.8 million people** identify as Indigenous, representing **5% of Canada's population**.

Spiritual Dynamics

- 1. Indigenous spirituality is deeply connected to the Creator, emphasizing harmony and stewardship.
- 2. Many resist Christianity due to historical injustices such as **residential schools**, where Christ's teachings were misrepresented, causing deep wounds.

3. However, many Indigenous people have embraced Christ, experiencing **spiritual rebirth** and finding hope in the message of salvation, healing, and restoration through Jesus Christ.

Call to Action

We must **seek clarity from God** to move forward in truth, healing, and reconciliation. We pray that **hearts will be opened, wounds will be healed, and God's love will restore** what was broken.

2. MOTIVATION – A Spiritual Call to Action

"Faith without works is dead." (James 2:26)

Motivation is the driving force behind healing, advocacy, and action. This conference calls on the Body of Christ, Indigenous and non-Indigenous believers, to **stand together and take responsibility** for reconciliation and transformation.

Systemic Barriers That Must Be Overcome

- 1. Broken Treaties & Government Policies Many Indigenous communities remain economically disadvantaged due to governmental structures that enforce fiscal dependency and systemic marginalization.
- 2. Socio-Economic Struggles Poverty, unemployment, poor housing conditions, and a lack of opportunities have led to crises in many Indigenous communities.
- 3. Cycles of Brokenness The consequences of these struggles include substance abuse, family breakdown, crime, suicides, and mental health crises.
- 4. The Tragedy of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women Over 1,100 Indigenous women have been documented as missing or murdered in Canada, highlighting a crisis of violence and systemic neglect.

Spiritual Call to Action

We are called to **move beyond awareness to action**—to pray, advocate, and partner with Indigenous communities in ways that **empower, heal, and uplift**. This includes:

- 1. Breaking cycles of poverty and injustice through sustainable development and Christ-centered leadership.
- 2. Strengthening Indigenous youth and families through education, mentorship, and discipleship.
- 3. Encouraging churches to engage in true reconciliation, acknowledging the past while actively working towards healing and restoration.

3. URGENCY – The Time to Act and Pray is Now

"If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray..." (2 Chronicles 7:14)

There is **no more time to wait**—the need for **spiritual revival, reconciliation, and healing** is urgent.

A National Call for Prayer

This conference calls on **Christian Indigenous leaders**, **churches**, **and intercessors** to gather in a national movement of prayer and worship for the healing of the land and its people.

Through faith, humility, and obedience to God, we will:

- 1. Seek forgiveness for the injustices committed against Indigenous peoples.
- 2. **Intercede for healing**, asking God to break generational curses and restore Indigenous communities.
- 3. Declare God's promises over the land, believing in spiritual awakening and renewal.

Four Pillars of the National Prayer Movement

1) Worshiping the Creator and Acknowledging the biblical Jesus as Lord

- 1. Honoring the Creator of heaven and earth as the sovereign God over all nations.
- 2. Declaring that Jesus is the ultimate source of Healing and Reconciliation.

2) Acknowledging Wrongs and Seeking Repentance

- 1. Confessing the sins of historical injustices, including colonization, residential schools, and broken treaties.
- 2. Receiving God's forgiveness, restoration, and atonement.
- 3) Praying for Governments and Leaders
 - 1. Lifting up leaders in Canada to govern with wisdom, justice, and integrity.
 - 2. Praying for policies that uplift and empower Indigenous communities rather than oppress them.

4) Praying for the Peace of Jerusalem and Blessing the Nation of Israel

- 1. Honoring the biblical command to pray for the peace of Jerusalem (Psalm 122:6).
- 2. Believing that as we bless Israel, God will also bring healing and restoration to Indigenous peoples.

Conclusion: A Prophetic Call to Unity, Healing, and Transformation

The International Nations for First Nations Conference 2025 is more than an event—it is a divine appointment where believers unite in prayer, repentance, and intercession for the healing of Canada's Indigenous peoples and their land.

Through this gathering, we declare:

- The time for healing is now.
- The transformed church must rise in truth and action.
- Spiritual revival among Indigenous peoples will bring hope, restoration, and transformation.
- The land will be healed as we humble ourselves and seek God's face.

Let this be a watershed moment—a turning point in history where the church, Indigenous communities, and nations unite in faith for a future of justice, healing, and reconciliation.


VISION & MISSION
